These courses equip students with the knowledge and skills to address pressing social issues while actively engaging with local communities.

It is highly relevant at this time, especially in providing knowledge and raising awareness at the grassroots level among the Iban community in longhouses.

Objectives:

(i) Explaining the characteristics of good and effective leadership in addressing various issues and challenges at the grassroots level;

(ii) Discussing the importance of knowledge about Adat (customary practices) in the management of a longhouse;

(iii) Highlighting the role of Adat in preserving culture at the grassroots level.

Impacts to the Community:

- (i) Enhancing participants' knowledge of the fundamentals of leadership;
- (ii) Increasing participants' understanding of Adat (customary practices) and how to implement Adat at the longhouse level, in accordance with the Adat Iban 1993;





Sanggar Tari: Learning Culture, Embracing Sustainability

The Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities (FSSH) has taken a meaningful step in cultural sustainability with its Sanggar Tari initiative. It aims to preserve and promote the traditional dances by engaging and educating youth in its significance and practice. The tamat ceremony was held on 31 January 2024 and was attended by our collaborator, Dayak Cultural Foundation.







Impacts:

- Participants develop a deeper appreciation for Sarawak's cultural heritage through hands-on experience with traditional dance.
- Increased confidence and stage presence through participation in performances and workshops.
- Preservation of indigenous cultural identity by passing Ngajat to future generations.
- Enhanced sense of community and responsibility towards cultural sustainability among participants.

Sanggar Tari was established as part of FSSH's broader commitment to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly SDG 4 (Quality Education), SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities), and SDG 16 (Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions). By providing structured learning sessions on Ngajat, the initiative not only nurtures appreciation for Sarawak's rich cultural heritage but also ensures its continuity among younger generations.

Objectives:

- Cultural Preservation: To safeguard the art of Ngajat (and other traditional dances) by passing down traditional knowledge to younger generations.
- Youth Engagement: To instill a sense of pride and belonging among youth by immersing them in Sarawak's indigenous cultural expressions.
- Sustainability in Arts: To encourage the long-term practice of traditional dances through regular training, community involvement, and performances at cultural events.

This year, in 2024, I had the opportunity to visit a friend's longhouse and was able to practice and perform during the recent Gawai celebration, even though I have not yet mastered all the movements.

Sanggar Tari 2024: Study Visit to Dayak Cultural Foundation



The Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities (FSSH) visited the Dayak Cultural Foundation (DCF) as part of the Sanggar Tari programme, strengthening collaborations in cultural preservation and education. This partnership aligns with Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 4: Quality Education and SDG 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities by promoting cultural heritage and lifelong learning through traditional performing arts.

During the visit, DCF showcased a variety of traditional dances, offering insights into the rich cultural heritage of the region. Their skilled performers demonstrated intricate movements and symbolic expressions, reflecting the diverse ethnic traditions of Sarawak. By preserving and sharing these traditions, the programme contributes to SDG 11.4: Strengthen efforts to protect and safeguard the world's cultural and natural heritage.

Beyond performances, DCF also conducted a short workshop, allowing participants to engage hands-on with traditional dance techniques and musical instruments. Students and staff from FSSH benefited from direct coaching by professional dancers, gaining a deeper understanding of traditional art forms. They were also given a glimpse into the studio of DCF's professional dancers, experiencing firsthand the dedication and discipline required in cultural performance. This interactive experience supports SDG 4.7, which emphasizes the role of education in fostering appreciation for cultural







diversity and sustainable development.

The community benefitted by having vegetables for their own consumptions and earning income from the sales of the vegetables. From 2 November till 11 December 2024, they generated approximately RM1285.90 from the sales.








Wacana Industri & Komuniti 2024



Reduce Plastics, Make Fantastic Ecobricks!

SSR2023: Environmental Dimension in Development



Introduction

Students from the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities (FSSH), Universiti Malaysia Sarawak (UNIMAS) are doing what they can to reduce mismanaged plastic waste through the "Reduce Plastic, Make Fantastic Ecobricks!" project involving five secondary schools around Kota Samarahan and Kuching.

This project, carried out in collaboration with the Natural Resources and Environmental Board (NREB) Sarawak, is part of the Faculty's EXCEL CARE (Community Resilience Experiential Learning) activities. It is done through the collaboration and active participation of Kelab Pencinta Alam Sekitar (PALS) of the respective schools.

Ecobricks

The main objective of the CARE project is to raise awareness and educate students, especially secondary school students, about the environmental impact of uncontrolled plastic waste. This ecobrick project was introduced as an initiative to reduce the amount of plastic waste generated.

The activities conducted include:

- 1. A knowledge-sharing session on plastic waste pollution
- 2. An introductory briefing on ecobricks by students and lecturers from FSSH.
- 3. A hands-on ecobrick-making activity with the students.
- 4. Closed competition between participating schools to make the best ecobrick stool.





Achievements

Mr. Gustian bin Haji Durani (Pemangku Setiausaha Perbandaran) applauded the idea behind ecobricks that is in line with MPKS's aim to turn Kota Samarahan into a lowcarbon city. The council has planned numerous activities and engagements involving the community to create a greener, healthier and more sustainable Kota Samarahan.

SLUSE Interdisiplinary Fieldcourse 2024



What is SLUSE?

SLUSE-M (SLUSE-Malaysia) is a capacity-building academic programme for the promotion of sustainable land use and natural resource management in Malaysia. The programme is modelled on a parallel programme initiated by a Danish consortium of universities in Denmark (SLUSE-Denmark). SLUSE-M has been running in UNIMAS since the year 2000, reflecting the sustainability of the programme.



Date

4th March until 15th March 2024

Participants

- 1. Thirty (30) students from countries within and outside Europe including Denmark, Spain, Germany, Canada, Norway, Austria, Poland, USA, Switzerland and Bangladesh, who are pursuing their Master's degrees at the University of Copenhagen and Roskilde University.
- 2. Thirty-five (35) of UNIMAS students.
- 3.Ten (10) resource persons from UNIMAS.
- 4. Three (3) from Denmark









Students were divided into six groups and each group, consisting of Malaysian and Danish students, was assigned to respective villages within Balai Ringin, Gedong, Pantu and Sri Aman districts. The data for their research were obtained using interdisciplinary approaches which are the combination of methods of social sciences and natural sciences; e.g. participatory rural appraisal (PRA), rapid rural appraisal (RRA), water and soil sampling and forest resource assessment.

Development Planning & Management Programme

Development Planning & Management Programme



In an inspiring collaboration between Grab Malaysia, Open Street Map (OSM), and the Development Planning and Management Programme of the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities (FSSH) at Universiti Malaysia Sarawak (UNIMAS), the Grab GeoStars x UNIMAS 2024 programme has successfully equipped students with crucial map editing skills and practical applications of these technologies.

Running from May to June 2024, the programme focused on developing students' technical abilities in map editing using the OSM and Map Your City (MYC) platforms. Participants were tasked with improving data accuracy and contributions to these platforms, fostering a spirit of healthy competition and excellence. To enhance the value of their learning, participation in this programme was also part of the assessment for the course SSR2093: Introduction to Remote Sensing, integrating practical skills with academic learning.



Before they began with their tasks, participants received comprehensive online training. The first training on OSM Data Improvement was led by Mr. Mikko Tamura from OSM Philippines. This session provided students with the skills needed to enhance OSM data. The second training, i.e. MYC Data Input, was conducted by Ms. Shafiqah Zaini from Grab Malaysia, and the session focused on the specifics of inputting data into the MYC platform. After that, participants were given two weeks to complete all the tasks.

The closing ceremony for the Grab GeoStars x UNIMAS 2024 programme was held on June 20, 2024. The momentous occasion was attended by representatives from Grab HQ, Ms Maryam Abu Bakar and Mr Haziq Ekhwan, and representative from OSM, Mr Ahmad Kamal Effendy.

Representatives from OSM and Grab provided feedback on the students' editing skills, highlighting areas of excellence and suggesting opportunities for further development. The event also featured a knowledge transfer session and a Karta Cam demonstration by two invited Grab drivers, Mr Maizun and Mr Azmi, adding practical industry perspectives to the celebration.

Global Engagement



Politics and Government Studies Programme & FISIP, UNTAN

A group of 36 third year students from the Politics and Government Studies, Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities went across the border for a mobility programme. The four-day educational visit to Fakultas Ilmu Sosial dan Ilmu Politik (FISIP), Universitas Tanjungpura (UNTAN), Pontianak, Indonesia was organised by the Political and Governmental Studies Society (Polgov) and Professor Dr. Neilson Ilan Mersat served as its advisor.







The educational visit aims to strengthen international ties and enhance student engagement between the two institutions. A number of activities were conducted in collaboration with their UNTAN counterparts – Himpunan Mahasiswa Ilmu Politik (HIMAPOL) and Himpunan Mahasiswa Ilmu Pemerintahan (HIMAPEM). The highlight was the academic seminar on International Bureaucracy of Malaysia and Indonesia. Ms. Nur Najwa Atira binti Nor Rihan represented UNIMAS, while the other speakers were from FISIP UNTAN.

Another sharing session was conducted with the Provincial People's Representative Council of West Kalimantan (Dewan Perwakilan Rakyat Provinsi Kalimantan Barat). The session aimed to facilitate an exchange of insights and experiences regarding government and politics in Malaysia and Indonesia. By discussing governance structure, political systems, and policy frameworks, participants sought to deepen understanding, foster collaboration, and strengthen diplomatic ties between the two regions. This dialogue provided valuable perspectives, identified areas for potential cooperation, and promoted mutual learning in the realm of governance and politics.

The Kuliah Kerja Lapangan (Field Work Study) by History Education students from the Faculty of Teacher Training and Education (FKIP), Universitas Tanjungpura (UNTAN), to the Faculty of Social Sciences and Humanities (FSSH), UNIMAS, on August 20, 2024, was a significant milestone in the growing academic collaboration between the two institutions. This partnership reflects FSSH's commitment to fostering international engagement and crosscultural learning opportunities.



Held at the FSSH Conference Room, the event brought together scholars, students, and faculty members in a dynamic exchange of knowledge, cultural perspectives, and academic experiences. The UNTAN delegation, comprising three lecturers and 24 students from FKIP, engaged in discussions and activities aimed at strengthening research and educational ties between the two universities. This collaboration not only enhances academic networking but also promotes a deeper understanding of regional histories, cultures, and social dynamics.

Haris Firmansyah, a lecturer from the History Education Program at FKIP UNTAN, delivered an interesting presentation titled "Mengenal Kota Pontianak: Toponimi dan Perkembangan Pemukimannya." His lecture provided valuable insights into the history of Pontianak, examining its toponymy and settlement patterns while shedding light on the socio-cultural forces that have shaped the city's development over time.







Dr Juna Liau, FSSH, then did a sharing on "Masyarakat Sempadan Kalimantan-Sarawak," exploring the cultural, social, and economic interactions of cross-border communities. She highlighted the fluidity of borders and shared heritage that transcends national boundaries, offering an anthropological perspective on their lived experiences.

This is followed by Dr Sharifah Sophia Wan Ahmad with a sharing on a historical overview of the "Pergerakan Anti Penyerahan di Sarawak 1946-1951." Her presentation delved into the anti-cession movement in Sarawak, highlighting the local resistance against British colonial rule.

The visit benefited both universities: UNTAN students and faculty gained exposure to new academic perspectives, while UNIMAS strengthened research through knowledge exchange and regional cultural insights. It also raised hopes for continued academic collaboration in the coming years.
